## Members reveal their frustrations

MORE than 2,000 u3a members participating in a survey with Design Age Institute this year said packaging is the most frustrating every day object as we age.

Over 60% of all respondents chose it as their main frustration.

Things such as struggling to open a carton of orange juice, or peel back plastic wrapping on food can cause tempers to fray.

Other items which were identified as causing significant frustration and annoyance include:

- )] Duvet covers 13.3%
- )] TV remotes 5%
- )] High cupboards 5%
- )] Keys and locks 3.5%

# Conference speaker turns to crime

ONE of the speakers at our regional conference earlier in the year has just published his fifth novel ... on crime.

**Maldon u3a** member Patrick Forsyth, 79, has even set it in his home town.

Where There's A Will is based on Kathy who visits a prison inmate as a favour to a distant relative but has an unexpected encounter and forms a new friendship.

They then must prevent a tragedy following a disturbing rumour.

Patrick said: "Over the years most of my writing has been non-fiction, but I enjoy writing fiction too and this is my fifth novel.

"I guess it's what has recently been christened 'cosy crime', because the protagonists are ordinary people caught up in circumstances that involve them with difficulties or crime of some sort – here a planned assassination."

- Is it affordable? Rent, mortgage, service charge, bills

- How accessible is it? Slopes, steps, transport

- Is it safe? Security, hazards and risk of accident & falls

- How many stairs? Can lift be fitted?

- Could a toilet/ shower be put on ground floor?

- Will adaptations be practical and affordable?

- Will it be affordable to heat and repair?

- Will it be easy to look after and clean?

### Growth Matters: October 17, 10am



Many people attended with memories of shopping trips in The Broadway, whether they had lived there for five or 50 years.


The exhibition had a display board documenting cinemas and bingo halls with comments from people who remember the treat of a cinema visit in days gone by.

The two-day free exhibition was held as part of the national u3a movement's 40th anniversary celebrations.

# Topical studies



Study aids ... Black Tudors, Thomas Clarkson and a BBC still of TV's Black and British.

AFTER watching David Olusoga's BBC TV programme "Black and British" and reading Miranda Kauffman's "Black Tudors", I began to realise that there was a certain part of Britain's History that was being either ignored or forgotten or, worse still, hidden.

Having run a History 4 Fun Group for several years it was interesting to see that there was a chunk of History, as taught in schools, which was being ignored.

We began as a small group and started researching certain periods of History, beginning with the obvious, the Romans.

By the very means of developing their army and conquering new lands the Romans assimilated many nationalities into their army with the promise of the reward of becoming a Roman citizen after 20 years of service in the army.

So, looking at Hadrian's Wall, and then Septimus Severus, who was born in Libya and became an emperor of Rome it became obvious that this was just a starting point.

Further research was easy to find but not well known. It was all there waiting to be found and so it was not actually hidden but just not on the curriculum when we were at school.

This is not a case of re-writing History just a case of showing what is there, and always has been there, but ignored for whatever political reason.

During our studies we found out about the Beachy Head skeleton from Roman times and Julia Tertia, also known as the "Ivory Bangle Lady" found in Roman York.

She had rich grave goods and was proved to have North African, as well as "white" characteristics in her heritage.

Evidence is found in second and third century Roman Leicester and London.

We also found that a skeleton from medieval times was found at Greyfriars in Ipswich. That was quite a revelation as most of us live within four or five miles of Ipswich and knew nothing about this man.

In her book "Black Tudors" Miranda Kauffman shows that parish records can help find that the ten African people she describes were not necessarily slaves but free men and woman who had skills and were independent.

We have now moved onto the time of the slave trade and the abolitionists.

One of the greatest of these, Thomas Clarkson, is now buried less than four miles from where I live in the village of Playford, near Woodbridge,

There is so much more to research and explore but that is for the future of our group.

If you think about starting a group about this subject I am certain you will be surprised what you can find.
